You will still see the care provider. It is important that the office is made aware of any symptoms so proper steps can be taken to keep everyone safe, healthy, and able to continue to provide services. Anyone visiting any SHA facility must wear a mask while in the facility. This will be provided.

WHY SHOULD I GET MY COVID-19 VACCINE BOOSTERS?

Protection against Omicron is not as good as against Delta, and appears to decline over time.

- Vaccine effectiveness 2-24 weeks after dose #2 is 19% against symptomatic Omicron infection.
- 25 or more weeks after dose #2 drops to 6% against symptomatic Omicron infection.
- Two doses offers 52-60% protection against hospital visits, and this decreases to about 40% 6 months or more from second vaccine.
- Vaccine effectiveness 2-4 weeks after dose #3 is 68% against symptomatic Omicron infection.
- 5-9 weeks after dose #3, 58% effective against symptomatic Omicron infection.
- 10 or more weeks after dose #3, 50% effective against symptomatic Omicron infection.

Vaccine effectiveness against hospitalization after 2 doses is good (64-86%). This declines after 6 months to 52-57%.

Vaccine effectiveness against hospitalization after dose #3 is high (88-95%). This declines to 83-89% after 10 weeks.

If you have any questions regarding vaccinations, please contact the clinic and we will book you an appointment with a health care provider that can answer your questions.

PLANTER PROJECT

After an outpouring of positive response over last year's planters, we are happy to report that two more planters will be purchased for Main Street. A total of 4 planters will be planted in June and placed on the boulevard.

Multiple financial contributions were made to make this happen. \$820 was raised through the 50/50 Raffle organized by the Rec Board; the Maryfield Flower Power Committee donated \$1000; the Village of Maryfield donated \$1000; and proceeds from the community supper and dance were added to the fund. These funds will go towards purchasing new planters, soil and flowers. Any remaining funds will be used next year to purchase flowers.

It is always great to see groups come together in town to support the requests of our community. Thank you to everyone who purchased tickets on the raffle and to all those who have contributed to the planter funds through straight donations. Two groups have committed to helping with the planter project this year. The Village of Maryfield will be placing, removing, and storing the planters along with filling the planters with water once a week. A subcommittee of the Maryfield Flower Power will be responsible for purchasing, planting, and weeding the planters as well as any extra watering that is needed.

Exhibit Hint: Onions

- Uniformly hard
- Uniform in shape, size, colour and maturity
- Neck should be narrow and withered.
- Outer skins must be dried, intact and not removed.
- Trim tops and roots to $\frac{1}{2}$ " (1 cm) in length.
- Outer skins should show some yellow colour.
- Onions should be pulled, dried and have soil brushed off of the outer skin





PDAP - UNINSURABLE LOSS OF LIVESTOCK DUE TO STORMS:

The RM has been approved by the Provincial Disaster Assistance Program (PDAP) for financial assistance with any non-insurable livestock losses you may have incurred. If you have sustained losses due to the storms that came through April 13th – 15th, 2022 AND/OR April 22nd – 24th, 2022 please contact the Municipality asap so we can either email or mail the forms out to you!

SASK. MUNICIPAL HAIL INSURANCE – *Storms are Unpredictable.... We aren't!*

- Premiums are collected as a tax and payment is interest free to December 31st;
- Discount of 5% is allowed if premiums are paid by September 30th;
- Continuous coverage for landowners. Crop exemptions;
- Insurance in effect until October 15.... Fire coverage in effect to October 31;
- All insured crops are covered for shatter loss from hail whether standing or cut until October 31;
- Full coverage, straight deductible or disappearing deductible coverage

ADDITIONAL MUNICIPAL HAIL INSURANCE

- Annual policy application;
- Provides coverage on crops on rented land or additional coverage on land already insured by SMHI;
- Premiums paid at time of application - cheque, credit card (Visa/MasterCard);
- Coverage with Sask. Municipal Hail Insurance not required.

SASK. MUNICIPAL HAIL - \$1000 SCHOLARSHIPS

SMHI supports the next generation of smart minds through their Municipal hail Insurance Scholarships. 5 scholarships are awarded annually in July to students enrolled in a university or technical institute in the Province of Saskatchewan and are a dependent of a client, an employee or an agent of Municipal Hail. Please visit www.rmofmaryfield.com and go to **Maps & Links** to download an application form. Successful applicants will be notified by July 31st.

DUST CONTROL

The dust control program for 2022 will be underway shortly (mid-late June). If you are wanting dust control on your frontage, please call the office at 306-

646-2033 for instructions, stakes and new waiver form asap. Do not wait until the last minute – get on the list today.

CONTROL BURN NUMBER

If you are going to be burning **PLEASE CALL THE CONTROL BURN** number **1-866-404-4911**. If the fire department should get called out **YOU WILL BE BILLED A MINIMUM CALL OUT FEE!** In the event there is a Fire Ban in our RM - you will not be given permission for a control burn therefore should the fire department be dispatched you **WILL** be billed!

Each year, the RM has “spray companies” requesting a list of the Organic Lands within our boundaries – IF you are a certified organic farmer – please contact the RM office so that we are able to share these land locations with Sprayers.

The RM is once again looking for Emergency Measures information to be updated, this includes emails and cell phone numbers to be used to contact you in case of an emergency.

The RM has started an email list for those wishing to be notified for burn bans and other important information. If this is something that interests you, please send us an email to rm91@sasktel.net stating you would like to be added to the email list.

MOWING OF DITCHES

It is the intent of the R.M. of Maryfield to start the 2022 mowing program towards the end of June this year, weather dependent. If you are planning on cutting the ditches for the purpose of haying them, it would be greatly appreciated if you could advise us of the locations that you will be cutting. **Please be aware** that when we are mowing - the municipality will be mowing a minimum of 15 feet from the road – if you are farming the ditches – your crop will be cut down.

SPRAYERS IN DITCHES

The R.M. of Maryfield is asking that ratepayers who spray and hire custom applicators with hi-clearance sprayers to please use approaches to enter your fields. Driving through the ditches causes many ruts. The R.M. of Maryfield mows ditches and willows to keep the roads safe for all rate payers throughout the fall and winter seasons. With increased ruts comes increase costs of repairs and more down time - these ditches may not get mowed. Any damage/ruts in the ditches will be cleaned up and billed back to the ratepayer should the municipality have to do clean up.

DEVELOPMENT PERMITS

Please remember if you are putting up any structures on your property you are required to have a development permit. If you are thinking of putting up a structure, house, bins or sheds please come to the office and fill out the paper work so it can be approved at a meeting.

AGRICULTURE SAFETY SPOTLIGHT – Anhydrous Ammonia

Nitrogen fertilizer usage in Western Canada has increased from 1.6 Million tonnes to nearly 2.3 Million tonnes in the last decade, and Anhydrous Ammonia (NH3) makes up a large portion of this increase. NH3 is the richest form of nitrogen available for producers. As a fertilizer, it provides essential nitrogen for plants. It is safe to work with NH3 as long as it is stored, transported, and handled properly. Before

working with Anhydrous Ammonia, ask your retailer to explain the step-by-step procedures for NH3 application. See www.rmofmaryfield.com for Fertilizer Canada recommendations for precautions for working with NH3.

BOOK REVIEW: *Little Women* by Louisa May Alcott. Ms Alcott has a knack of drawing the reader into the lives of the March family as they struggle to remain cheerful in the face of hard times brought on by their husband/father joining the army during the War Between the States (1861- 1865). The mother and the two oldest girls have to go to work at jobs they don't much like since the only breadwinner in the family is absent. They put aside their dreams of education and parties and fall out of the social life they had expected to continue leading. Each of the four girls has definite personalities and their day-to-day activities now include mending and remaking clothes, helping with housework and cooking but also going on picnics, making up their own games and sometimes getting into trouble. The first part of the book talks about the family life of the girls at home; the second part is the story of their lives as they become young adults. Do they find romance or do they become independent of the male-dominated life they are expected to lead?

Reading about Ms Alcott in the introduction made the book all the more interesting. She was an early feminist, seeing no reason why a woman could not be independent and earn enough money to live on; why did they have to

marry, especially where no love was involved, just to keep a roof over their heads & be accepted by society.

Little Women was immediately popular, earning Alcott a living with its sales but she remained caught in the web of an autocratic, male-dominated society. She went on to write more books but succumbed to the publisher's and the public's need for happy traditional endings with a man to look after the 'fragile woman' (my quote marks). She said herself that she needed to make a living and romantic stories sold. *Little Women* is based on Alcott's own life - 3 sisters and a much loved mother. Alcott was the rebellious one of the four. Speaking of *Little Women*, Alcott said "not a bit sensational, but simple and true, for we really lived most of it." The references in the back to the many titles of books, essays & treatises read by the girls are also interesting. Most of them are not items that we read today but would have been common education at that time. There were very few books written for the enjoyment of the reader; most were written as philosophical and moralistic guides to the reader. Women in 'society' were expected to know them but only men thought they could truly understand them and debate them. Although Alcott herself wrote many serious essays & books, some of which sold fairly well, she was on the forefront of the explosion of fiction books being written and of female authors writing them.


