Fair Hints About Judging: *If you are new to exhibiting or judging, please check all the details in the Fairbook for the class you are interested in. Under the Class number is usually a description of what the class is about. Some of the items in a class may have a specific description e.g. under FOODS is #14 decorated cake, 100% decoration - for this item, the judge would not taste the cake; only the decoration would be judged. Under QUILTS - almost all the items have descriptions for the type of quilt. The judge must check the overall design, the workmanship and the suitability of the quilted item for its purpose. Pieces of art may be judged 50% on aesthetic value and 50% on workmanship or there may be a different percentage split depending on the guides in*

the Fairbook. There is some information about standards online BUT each Fair has its own specifics for entries so:

- 1. Check the CLASS for details.*
- 2. Check the exhibit description, if any.*
- 3. Use your own knowledge on the subject being judged.*

It is helpful to exhibitors when the judge writes a short note on the back of the entry card - positive comments and/or advice as to improvements.

A judge may give 2 firsts, seconds or thirds in a class if the exhibits are deemed equal in value.

UNITED CHURCH OF CANADA CELEBRATES ITS 100TH ANNIVERSARY

The United Church of Canada will be celebrating the 100th Anniversary of its inauguration which occurred on June 10 in 1925. At the turn of the 20th Century western Canada was being settled and communities sprang up but populations remained sparse. Because it was difficult to sustain a church congregation, many churches of different denominations came together to form union churches. By 1925 Methodists, Congregationalists and 70% of the Presbyterian congregations had agreed to amalgamate and the United Church of Canada was formed by an act of parliament.

To honor this event Maryfield St. Andrews United Church will be recognizing this Union in the following ways:

1. A bulletin board will be formed with a collage of Maryfield and Fairlight attendees. (If anyone has pictures of family members who attended, please email them to Janet Lemon, janettlemon@gmail.com or 306-646-7672)
2. Where are they now? Over the next 4 months biographies of past ministers will be highlighted in the newsletter.
3. At our cold plate luncheon on Thursday, June 5 we will cut a cake decorated to honour this 100th Anniversary.
4. On the following Sunday, June 8, the regular service at 9:30 will highlight the history of the United Church's formation.

We want to honour and pay tribute to the contributions that our ancestors made in founding the United Church of Canada.

What Have I Been Up To?

At the end of April, 2013, my eight-year sojourn in ministry with Crossroads United Pastoral Charge (Wawota United Church and St. Andrews United Church, Maryfield) ended. I packed the car and headed west to Vancouver Island and Brechin United Church in



Nanaimo. My partner, John, also a United Church minister, was finishing up an appointment with the Alameda/Oxbow Pastoral Charge before shifting into retirement and joined me in British Columbia at the end of October, 2013. We bought a house on Gabriola Island, a twenty-minute ferry ride from Nanaimo, and settled into Gulf Island life. Brechin United Church shifted me from rural to urban ministry. Brechin was in the process of committing to a redevelopment project with a vision to integrate a new church build with affordable housing. Ministry and redevelopment were parallel processes, and while the challenges and dynamics of preparing for a new build proved lengthy and often challenging, the ministry charged along. Brechin completed the two-year process to become an Affirming Ministry in 2015. The community of faith responded to the Syrian refugee crisis and sponsored a family. Refugee sponsorship then shifted focus and ROAR (Reaching Out Assisting Refugees) was birthed to welcome newcomers in peril because of their sexuality or gender identity. ROAR is now an independent community initiative and I have been on the Board of Directors for several years as the representative of a sponsorship group that welcomed a new-
come to Nanaimo in 2023. On June 30, 2019, I retired from full time ministry. The old Brechin church had been demolished in April, 2018 in preparation for the new build. The community of faith shifted its ministry to a rented house for the administrative side of things and worshipped each Sunday at Sands Funeral Home. The new build faced delay af-

ter delay and while I had hoped to move with the congregation into the new church, this was not to be, and became the task for their next minister to fulfil. With ongoing construction challenges plus the Covid pandemic, opening of the new church and the attached 74-unit apartment building finally came to be in December 2022. My retirement hasn't actually fully taken as yet. In 2021, mid-Covid, I enjoyed a year long appointment to Campbell River United Church. In 2023, I stayed closer to home and was appointed to Christ Church Gabriola, a shared United Church/Anglican ministry, for a year. In between appointments I happily fill in as pulpit supply for congregations within an hour or so of Nanaimo. Currently, I am doing a three-month appointment back at Brechin United Church, this time in the new church building, while they await the arrival of their next new minister as of February 1, 2025. In a way it is full circle, and I am enjoying this brief return to them very much. John and I enjoy our home and life on Gabriola Island. John has a 25 foot power boat that enables us to travel and anchor overnight in some pretty spectacular coastal scenery. He enjoys fishing, and we both enjoy kayaking and paddleboarding. We still have the 1988 Pleasure Way van we purchased from Wawota's Marie Vail for camping excursions. Retirement encouraged me to try new things and I joined the Gabriola Photography Club and tried my hand at water colour painting. John and I enjoy singing with several choirs. The Vancouver Island Singers, a travelling choir, enabled us to sing our way around Croatia, Scotland and Spain. Our combined families of six adult children (four in Calgary, two in Ontario) have gifted us with eleven grandchildren. If damage is done within our road allowance and council determines that it creates an emergent danger to the public – the RM will repair the damage and may add any costs incurred in eliminating the emergency to the tax roll in respect of which the person causing the emergency is the assessed person.


